# iuyer's Reports 1992 :elia Plunkett

I have so often stopped in surprise in front of a painting in a museum - in surprise, admiration and delight - and found it was a CAS donation. I hope the five works I have bought will similarly arrest people; leaving powerful, wondering impressions.

Four of the pieces come from artists whose work I have followed, admired, coveted - lusted after - for a long time. Eileen Cooper's drawings were more of a personal discovery. Her drawing Whisper I love for the contrast between the huge bold blatant execution of the figure and its self-contained sense of wonder, mystery and knowledge.

Wonder too in Richard Long's Mississippi Mud piece, and tremendous power and presence. A moment, an image captured, transformed and empowered.

Michael Craig-Martin's Glass of Water painting stops, surprises, puzzles me. Yet it is so spare and elegant, and quite extraordinarily emotive.

Bridget Riley's small untitled oil painting is to me an urban painting; jazzy, gangsterish - a spirit of Chicago or Naples perhaps?

Andy Warhol's polaroid prints of Liza Minnelli and Joseph Beuys are history. Perhaps it was a cheat to buy them for the Contemporary Art Society - but I couldn't resist them. For me they are an essence of a particular time.

I do hope that the wonder, magic and excitement that I have found in the looking, choosing and contemplating of these pieces will not turn out to be something wholly personal.

# RAFT BUYER // Artina Margetts

At the risk of sounding like a gushing Oscar-winner, I would like to record what a privilege (and taxing!) pleasure it has been to collect crafts for the CAS during 1992. The Society's aims are crucial in a country which does not do enough to nurture contemporary culture. I thank the staff for their invitation and enthusiastic support, the Crafts Council, who annually contribute additional purchase funds, the crafts galleries and especially the craftspeople.

In buying for the CAS, I decided to: spread the net across several crafts; fill some notable gaps; balance tradition and innovation in terms of form and content, and include some works by craftspeople with emerging reputations. I bought new works principally from the craftspeople direct and paid a

commission to Contemporary Applied Arts in Covent Garden, the leading crafts gallery which has held solo shows of several of the craftspeople whose work I chose. I bought an earlier ceramic dish by Carol McNicoll at auction at Bonhams.

In wishing to promote bookbinding and printed works in the CAS Collection, I experienced the exciting process of commissioning, bringing together the work of the distinguished bookbinder Romilly Saumarez-Smith, with Ken Currie's compelling narrative woodcuts, Story from Glasgow published by the Paragon Press.

I was delighted to choose major works from Michael Rowe, Alison Britton, Mary Restieaux, and Peter Chatwin and Pamela Martin, who have all spearheaded important developments in their respective crafts of silversmithing and metalwork, ceramics, textiles and woodwork. The public's perception of what crafts are has been changed by such works. The light by Thomas Eisl indicates the way in which craft works can synthesise the processes and purposes of art and design.

The necklace by Maria Wong and the ceramic Madonna and Child by Philip Eglin represent the interesting move in the crafts amongst many outstanding younger makers towards ambiguity, irony, allusion and narrative, eschewing formal abstraction. But change is always underpinned by the sensitive, imaginative use of skills and materials, and by the taproot of tradition. The basketry tray by the young maker Jenny Crisp, and the consummate blockprinted textiles by Susan Bosence indicate this delicate symbiosis. The continued existence of handmade crafts in our society, and their current impressive diversity, provides cause for celebration, as does the CAS's collecting policy in bringing such work to a wider public.

# AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CONTEMPORARY ART SOCIETY

We have audited the financial statements on pages 27 to 32 in accordance with approved auditing standards.

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the company's affairs at 31 December 1992 and of its deficit for the year then ended and comply with the Companies Act 1985.

# 1 Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

# a) Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

# b) Subscriptions

Credit is taken in full in the year to which the subscriptions relate

#### c) Grants

All grants are taken to credit in the year in which they are received with the exception of those for specific purposes which are taken to credit in the year in which the money is expended.

# d) Equipment

Office furniture, fittings and equipment are written off in the income and Expenditure Account when acquired.

# e) Purchases of Pictures and Sculptures

No value is included in the Balance Sheet for pictures, sculptures and crafts purchased by or presented to the Society and temporarily retained pending presentation to art galleries etc. or in exceptional cases, for sale. Such purchases are written off in the year of acquisition.

#### f) Fixed Assets - Investments

Investments shown as fixed assets are stated at the lower of cost and net market value

#### 11 Subsidiary Company

The Society has a wholly owned subsidiary, Contemporary Art Society Projects Limited, which is incorporated in the UK. Contemporary Art Society Projects Limited receives fees for advice given pertaining to the purchases of works of contemporary art and commission from the organisation of the sales of works of art. As these activities are fundamentally different from those of the Society, consolidated accounts have not been prepared. The profits earned are passed to the Society by means of a deed of covenant. Five members of the committee of the Society sit on the Board of Contemporary Art Society Projects Limited but receive no remuneration for doing so.

A summary of Contemporary Art Society Projects Limited's transactions for the period ended 31 December 1992 and the financial position at that date is set out below. Full accounts have been filed with the Registrar of Companies.

# THE ROLE OF THE **CONTEMPORARY ART** SOCIETY

The Contemporary Art Society encourages the collecting of contemporary art by art museums, companies and individuals.

It fosters the enjoyment and understanding of contemporary art and introduces it to a wider public.

The Society purchases works of art for gift to some 50 museums throughout the country, and also helps museums to build collections. The works of art are by living artists. Selection is entrusted to individuals not to a committee.

The Society, which has extensive contacts and links with artists and commercial galleries throughout Britain, uses its expertise to advise and assist companies on the acquisition of paintings and sculpture. It is completely independent having no contracted artists or stock.

The Society encourages individuals to collect for themselves and enjoy art by living artists. The annual Art Market provides the opportunity to see and buy reasonably priced art for the home. In addition, an extensive range of courses on collecting, a regular newsletter, events, studio visits, lectures and debates provide a 'look behind the scenes'. These activities are educational and fun.

The Society also serves as a channel for gifts and beguests of 20th Century art.

As an independent voice the Society brings contemporary art issues to the notice of opinion formers.

A registered charity supported by its members, it receives grants for specific projects from the Arts Council, the Crafts Council and the Henry Moore Foundation. The resources generated from advising companies, from the Art Market, and from other activities go directly to purchasing works of art for art museums. The Society is therefore a major support to living artists.

For private members the CAS has a two-tier membership scheme:

- i) £15 pa for individual members, or £20 pa for two people at the same address.
- ii) £30 pa for individual members, or £35 pa for two people at the same address.

  In addition to the benefits listed above, membership at this level entitles you to a 10% discount on works by gallery artists at over 25 leading commercial galleries and John Jones Frames.

For corporate members the minimum annual contribution is £500. The Society is a registered charity (no. 208178) and subscriptions can therefore be paid from trust funds or by covenant.
